Short description

Affectionately Yours was a one-year research project that explored the notion of affect. The theme of affect could be read in the light of If I Can't Dance's continuing exploration, since its inception, of certain intellectual paradigms such as feminism and performativity. What interested us in this notion is well articulated by Brian Massumi who says, "By 'affect' I don't mean 'emotion' in the everyday sense. The way I use it comes primarily from Spinoza. He talks of the body in terms of its capacity for affecting or being affected. These are not two different capacities – they always go together. When you affect something, you are at the same time opening yourself up to being affected in turn, and in a slightly different way than you might have been the moment before. You have made a transition, however slight. You have stepped over a threshold. Affect is this passing of a threshold."

The project included group reading sessions, lectures by guest speakers and the development of new works for a final exhibition in Gdansk, Poland, in collaboration with the Wyspa Institute of Art. Founded in 2004 by Aneta Szylak, Wyspa was an innovative artistic organization located on the grounds of Gdansk Shipyard in the building of the former Basic Shipbuilding School. The students' one-night exhibition took place on the Shipyard grounds, at Modelarnia.

The course included:

- Monthly meetings at the Dutch Art Institute in Enschede;
- Visit to If I Can't Dance Tonight with Stefanie Seibold and Teresa Maria Diaz Nerio, 'the jungle is a skyscraper', at Frascati, Amsterdam (22-09-09);
- Ten-day stay in Gdansk, Poland, with a public presentation on 1 May, daily group meetings on 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 May and a one-night exhibition at Modelarnia, on the Gdansk Shipyard.
